Research by Kim investigated how rater differences and task variations affect the reliability of writing scores among third and fourth graders. The study highlighted that inconsistencies among raters and the nature of writing tasks contribute to measurement errors, emphasizing the need for standardized scoring rubrics and multiple evaluators.

Effects of Writing on Learning in Content Areas. A meta-analysis by Graham, Kiuvara, and MacKay examined whether writing about content material in science, social studies, and mathematics facilitated learning. The study found that writing activities reliably enhanced learning across these subjects, indicating the broad benefits of integrating writing into various content areas.

"The effects of different task sequences on novice L2 learners' oral performance in the classroom" by Nayoung Kim: This study investigated optimal task sequencing for novice English learners. It compared three groups: one following a task complexity sequence (TC) and two others using guided planning with vocabulary (GPV) and content (GPC). The findings indicated that the TC group showed significant improvements in syntactic complexity, while the GPV group enhanced speed fluency. The study highlights the importance of task sequencing in developing various aspects of oral performance.

Another study related to evaluating oral performance in the classroom is "Influence of Strategies-Based Feedback in Students' Oral Performance" by Angie Sisquiarco, Santiago Sánchez Rojas, and José Vicente Abad: This action research assessed the impact of cognitive and metacognitive strategies-based feedback on the oral performance of sixth-grade students in Colombia. Utilizing assessment rubrics, self-assessment, and interviews, the study found that such feedback, when supported by prior strategies instruction, can enhance students' use of strategies and improve their oral performance.
