



THE CONCEPT AND ESSENCE OF LINGUOPOETICS

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Linguopoetics is one of the most significant and rapidly developing branches of modern linguistics, which studies the aesthetic and expressive potential of language in artistic texts. It represents an interdisciplinary field that integrates linguistic theory with literary analysis, focusing on how language functions as a means of artistic creation. The term “linguopoetics” itself reflects the unity of two domains: linguistics, which deals with the structure and function of language, and poetics, which studies the principles of artistic expression in literature. At its core, linguopoetics is concerned with the investigation of how linguistic units acquire aesthetic value and how they contribute to the creation of artistic meaning. Unlike traditional linguistics, which primarily focuses on normative and communicative aspects of language, linguopoetics emphasizes its expressive, emotional, and stylistic functions. It explores how phonetic, lexical, grammatical, and syntactic elements are organized in literary texts to produce specific artistic effects and to influence the reader’s perception. The concept of linguopoetics is closely related to the idea of the poetic function of language, which was introduced by the prominent linguist Roman Jakobson. According to Jakobson, language performs several functions, among which the poetic function is oriented toward the message itself, emphasizing its form and structure. In this context, linguopoetics studies how the form of language becomes meaningful and how it contributes to the aesthetic impact of a text. The essence of linguopoetics lies in its ability to reveal the hidden mechanisms of artistic language. Every literary text is a complex system in which linguistic elements are not used randomly but are carefully selected and organized by the author. This selection is determined by the author’s intention, cultural background, and stylistic preferences. Linguopoetic analysis allows researchers to uncover these patterns and to understand how meaning is constructed at different levels of the text. One of the key features of linguopoetics is its multi-level approach. It examines language at various levels, including phonetic, lexical, morphological, syntactic, and stylistic. At the phonetic level, linguopoetics studies sound organization, rhythm, rhyme, alliteration, and assonance, which contribute to the musicality and emotional tone of the text. At the lexical level, it focuses on word choice, semantic fields, connotations, and figurative language such as metaphors, similes, and symbols. At the syntactic level, it analyzes sentence structure, word order, parallelism, and other grammatical



features that influence the flow and emphasis of the text. Furthermore, linguopoetics is deeply connected with the concept of imagery. Artistic texts are characterized by their ability to create vivid images that evoke sensory and emotional responses in the reader. These images are constructed through linguistic means, and their analysis requires an understanding of how language functions beyond its literal meaning. Linguopoetics, therefore, investigates the relationship between linguistic form and imaginative content, highlighting the role of language in shaping artistic perception.

Another important aspect of linguopoetics is its focus on the individual style of the author, often referred to as idiolect. Each writer develops a unique way of using language, which distinguishes their works from those of others. This individual style is manifested through specific linguistic choices, recurring patterns, and preferred stylistic devices. Linguopoetic analysis enables researchers to identify these features and to interpret their significance within the broader context of the author's creative work. In addition to its focus on individual texts, linguopoetics also considers the broader cultural and historical context in which language is used. Literary texts are products of their time and reflect the social, cultural, and ideological conditions of the period in which they were created. Linguopoetic analysis takes these factors into account, providing a more comprehensive understanding of the text and its meaning. It is also important to note that linguopoetics is not limited to the analysis of classical literary texts. In modern linguistics, its scope has expanded to include various forms of discourse, including contemporary literature, media texts, and even digital communication. This expansion reflects the growing recognition of the importance of aesthetic and expressive aspects of language in all forms of human communication. The methodological basis of linguopoetics includes a variety of approaches and techniques. Among them are stylistic analysis, which focuses on the use of expressive means and stylistic devices; contextual analysis, which examines the relationship between linguistic elements and their context; and interpretative analysis, which seeks to uncover the deeper meaning of the text. These methods allow researchers to analyze texts from multiple perspectives and to gain a deeper understanding of their artistic structure. The development of linguopoetics as a scientific discipline is closely связан with the works of prominent linguists and literary scholars. In addition to Roman Jakobson, significant contributions have been made by scholars such as Van Dijk, who emphasized the importance of stylistic analysis in understanding literary language, and other representatives of structural and functional linguistics. Their work laid the foundation for the modern study of linguopoetics and its integration into the system of linguistic sciences. Linguopoetics represents a

At its most general level, linguopoetics can be defined as the study of the linguistic organization of artistic texts and the mechanisms through which linguistic units acquire aesthetic value. It focuses on the transformation of ordinary language into artistic language, where words, sounds, and grammatical structures are endowed with additional meanings and expressive functions. This transformation is not accidental but is determined by the author's creative intention, cultural context, and the communicative goals of the text. The concept of linguopoetics is deeply rooted in the theory of the functions of language. One of the most influential contributions in this area belongs to Roman Jakobson, who identified the poetic function as one of the fundamental functions of language. According to Jakobson, the poetic function is oriented toward the message itself, emphasizing its form and structure. In other words, in poetic discourse, the way something is said becomes as important as what is said. This idea forms the theoretical foundation of linguopoetics, which investigates how linguistic form contributes to meaning. The essence of linguopoetics lies in the understanding that language in literary texts operates according to special principles. Unlike everyday communication, where clarity and efficiency are primary goals, artistic language is characterized by ambiguity, richness of meaning, and emotional intensity. Linguopoetic analysis seeks to uncover these features by examining how linguistic elements interact to produce aesthetic effects. This involves not only identifying specific stylistic devices but also understanding their function within the overall structure of the text. One of the key theoretical principles of linguopoetics is the notion of foregrounding. This concept, developed within the framework of the Prague Linguistic Circle, refers to the use of linguistic means in such a way that they stand out against the background of ordinary



language. Foregrounding can be achieved through deviation from linguistic norms or through the repetition and parallelism of certain elements. In both cases, the aim is to draw the reader's attention to specific aspects of the text and to enhance its expressive impact. Linguopoetics studies how foregrounding operates at different levels of language and how it contributes to the creation of artistic meaning.

Another important concept in linguopoetics is defamiliarization introduced by the Russian formalist Viktor Shklovsky. According to this concept, the purpose of art is to make familiar objects appear strange and thus to renew the reader's perception of reality. This effect is achieved through the use of unusual linguistic forms, unexpected combinations of words, and innovative stylistic devices. Linguopoetic analysis examines how defamiliarization is realized in language and how it influences the reader's interpretation of the text. From a structural perspective, linguopoetics operates on multiple levels of language organization. At the phonetic level, it analyzes sound patterns such as alliteration, assonance, consonance, rhythm, and rhyme. At the syntactic level, linguopoetics examines sentence structure, word order, and the use of syntactic devices such as parallelism, inversion, ellipsis, and repetition. These elements play a crucial role in organizing the text and in guiding the reader's attention. Syntactic structures can create rhythm, emphasize certain ideas, and contribute to the overall coherence of the text. At the stylistic level, linguopoetics integrates all these aspects to analyze the overall artistic effect of the text. Style is understood as a system of linguistic choices that reflects the author's communicative purpose of the work. Linguopoetic analysis seeks to identify the distinctive features of this system and to interpret their significance. A central aspect of linguopoetics is its focus on the relationship



between form and content. In artistic texts, form is not merely a vehicle for content but an integral part of meaning. The choice of linguistic form influences how content is perceived and interpreted. Linguopoetics, therefore, emphasizes the inseparability of form and content and studies how they interact to create artistic meaning. In addition to its structural approach, linguopoetics also incorporates elements of cognitive linguistics. It recognizes that the interpretation of literary texts involves complex cognitive processes, including perception, memory, and imagination.
